Dear Friends,

I want to offer, on behalf of myself, Deacon Doug, Deacon Moise and the entire staff my hopeful prayers that you are doing okay as we continue this unusual time.

Hopefully soon, we will all be back at our parish, enjoying the blessings of having a community with which to share our faith.

Ironically, on Ash Wednesday, February 26th, a couple of weeks before the restrictions on gathering in large groups began, we had speakers at every Mass talking about returning to active participation at Church, and about six people actually spoke with myself or others about coming back. We had suspected Ash Wednesday is a day sometimes people "feel that pull" of Church and communal faith from the past. But now all of us are separated and it's certainty odd.

Having said that, let's remember that we aren't facing the challenges faced by many Christians around the world *THROUGHOUT THEIR LIVES*. So, maybe this time is a good one to pray for people who can't come to church because of health or mobility, or because they live in a place where their faith is restricted or even illegal. Maybe we can remember them a bit more poignantly at this time.

The other point I would like to make as we enter Holy Week 2020 (Palm Sunday April 5th-through Holy Saturday, April 11th) is that *LET'S NOT* use the current situation with our parish to allow us to excuse ourselves from making this a holy time.

We'll actually have some activities in which you can participate this coming week and some involve coming here to the parish.

COME DOWN FOR DRIVE-THROUGH CONFESSIONS: Saturday, April 4th from 3pm-4:30pm in the traffic circle out front (drive through), Wednesday, April 8th at 9:45am and also from 7pm-830pm, also drive through in the traffic circle out front.

COME DOWN FOR A BLESSING FROM THE MONSTRANCE – FROM YOUR CAR -- ON HOLY THURSDAY: Then, while Thursday night's Mass on April 9th, will be on-line/virtual only at 7:30pm and after the Mass, I'll be out on the Unity Hall balcony at the back of the Church complex with the monstrance to bless each car that drives by after the end of that Mass. So that after participating, virtually, in that special Mass where we remember the gift of the Holy Eucharist, you can come down to the parish to have you and your family blessed in your car with a special Eucharistic Benediction.

Good Friday, April 10th, you can participate in the online service at 2pm; Holy Saturday, April 11th, we'll have the Easter Vigil Mass at 8pm (longer service) and on April 12th, Easter Sunday on-line Mass at 9:15am.

COME DOWN FOR A BLESSING OF YOUR FAMILY – FROM YOUR CAR – USING EASTER HOLY WATER ON EASTER SUDAY. I'll be on the back balcony and you all can drive by and we can say "Happy Easter" to each other. I will use holy water, but don't worry because the water won't actually reach your car. But this is, again, a way for us to remember we are a family in faith on Easter Sunday. Since Mass is at 9:15am, I'll be out there from 10:15am -11:15am.

We also are still live streaming Daily Mass every day at 9am **except** Easter Monday, April 13th.

The Mysteries of the Rosary

Have you ever wanted to explore the life of Jesus and Mary in a deeper way? Each decade highlights a sacred episode:

Joyful Mysteries: Through the Annunciation (1) and Visitation (2), we get a glimpse at Mary's joyful yes to God. She gives birth to Jesus in the Nativity (3). Mary and Joseph present their son at the temple (4) and bring him there again when he is a teenager (5).

Luminous Mysteries: Jesus is baptized in the Jordan River (1) before Mary gives him a nudge to his first miracle at Cana (2). Jesus proclaims the Gospel (3), is transfigured on Mount Tabor (4), and institutes the Eucharist (5). The light is shining!

Sorrowful Mysteries: Jesus prays in agony in Gethsemane (1), knowing his hour of suffering has come. After his betrayal and arrest, Jesus is scourged (2) and crowned with thorns (3). He carries his cross (4), and Mary stands at the foot of the cross as he is crucified (5).

Glorious Mysteries: Christ is risen in glory (1)! After appearing to those he loves, he ascends into heaven (2). Jesus' followers receive the Holy Spirit at Pentecost (3) Mary, unaffected by original sin, is assumed body and soul into heaven (4), where she is crowned queen, humble mother of Christ the King (5).

A friend recently confided in me that although he prayed frequently each day and was involved heavily in his parish, he did not sense much fruit coming from it all and was left feeling unsatisfied. I assured him he was not alone. I told him of a deceased pastor of mine who had spoken frequently about being in this type of situation. Even as a priest, he knew all too well of how we can feel like we are simply going through the motions. It is precisely at those times that continuing to pray and practicing good stewardship is most important, because it would be easier to simply take a break and risk never coming back. He liked to say, "Do the drill," meaning just do what needs to be done.

We are all called to be mature disciples who answer the call of Jesus Christ regardless of the cost. We cannot choose when and where the call will come. We cannot schedule our stewardship in a way that is always most convenient for us. Even when the fruits of our faithful efforts seem hidden from us, we hold to the promise that we are never called to give of ourselves for nothing. God is working through us and in us. No matter how dry the land may seem, seeds are being planted to yield a harvest greater than we can ever realize. Stay strong and do the drill!

DEACON DOUG'S Q & A: *Question:* Why is the egg a symbol of Easter?

Answer to last week's question about palms and the donkey at Palm Sunday: In tradition the donkey is an animal of peace, unlike the horse, the animal of war. A king riding a donkey would symbolize his arrival in peace. Jesus would have thus symbolized his entry as the Prince of Peace, not as a war-waging king. To Roman observers, palms at a procession were a symbol of triumph when the victor laid down his arms and wore the toga, the civilian garment of peace.

SEW ANGELS: We have received an urgent request from several area facilities for the need of sewn masks including AAMC (see attached email/pattern). If you are able to make some of these at home and can drop them off to either Pam or Barbara (addresses

below) and leave on our porches we will make sure they get to those in need. They are very easy to make and sew up quickly. If you need fabric please let us know and we will leave on our porches for you as well. If you don't sew, but would like to cut out fabric, the sizes are 9x6 inches and we need two pieces of fabric per mask (100% cotton). If you use flannel for one side – prewash the flannel as it shrinks. Some are also inserting light interfacing in between the layers to give the mask shape/filter. Please let us know if you have any questions. You can also make ties/binding instead of elastic (20") across top and bottom if you don't have the elastic available.


