Dear Friends,

I write these notes for the bulletin, etc. a bit in advance (today is Apr. 16th) so sometimes by the time you see the note the message is a bit old, and maybe that is the case with the following – but I talked to three parishioners today and all three said that this year's Holy Week (finishing with Easter on Apr. 12th) was "the holiest" they had ever experienced. These were the same words used by all these people. What they said was that they missed everybody at Holy Family but that their busyness had been so curtailed this year (social gatherings, work, etc.) that they simply HAD THE TIME this year to focus on their faith.

Of course, these are all intentional people who did things like, one said, refuse to watch any television or to get on the internet, except for religious services on Good Friday and things like that.

I thought to myself, in the midst of the challenges we have, that, again, there are opportunities. As for myself, I had told more than one person that I have felt like Holy Week, for me, was like being in a monastery and "being filmed," being down at the quiet Church with few people and doing our livestreaming....and seeing very few people because of emergencies, and then talking a lot with people on the phone it feels like a monastery in the woods.

One of the three who I talked to today even used that same image with me, before I ever brought it up to them, that their Holy Week this year had been "like being in a monastery."

Anyway, today's Gospel is the story of the two disciples of Jesus leaving **ON EASTER SUNDAY** for their former lives. They had followed Jesus, but after his arrest and crucifixion and death they had lost hope and wanted to go home....and even though they knew that some of the women disciples had said that the tomb was empty, these two disciples were so disheartened (we can assume) that they were leaving Jerusalem for their original homes anyway.

Do you think their story is a lesson to not give up? That there will be challenges, big challenges in life and in being a Christian, but that sometimes if we just wait in faith, God will send us new reasons for hope? Let's think about that as we read the story of Emmaus this weekend.

ENVIRONMENTAL MINISTREE: Did you know that we are seeing lots of birds, like Robins that we haven't seen for awhile. Some, like the Junkos, are gone until next winter. Robins are seen frequently at the birdbaths and rooting around in the leaf clutter in search of

worms and insects. A few years ago we began seeing an occasional Bluebird. We began putting out mealworms and some houses for them and have Bluebirds year round. Along with the Yellow Finches the boys have gone from muted to brilliant colors at the Niger feeder. The girls pick up a small bit of color, but need to stay hidden when they are sitting on the nest, so they don't change much. The Cardinals like hanging out in the Dogwoods and love sunflower seeds. As of the 15th, we still haven't seen any Hummingbirds, but that feeder has been out for weeks. We get so excited. Please let me know when you see them. Lots of woodpeckers Redbelled. Downey Hairy and with Nuthatches at the suet and hulled sunflower feeders. Of course, my personal favorite the House Wrens, have been with us all year, chiding me when going out the basement sliding door. They always build their nest within 10 feet of the door so this is a year round conversation. With the field book at hand, the future is bright. Chris Gordon -OFS at christophergordon@verizon.net.



OLPH FOOD PANTRY: Bless you all for your continued generosity and thank you to the folks still delivering to the pantry! The Mysteries of the Rosary

Have you ever wanted to explore the life of Jesus and Mary in a deeper way? Each decade highlights a sacred episode:

Joyful Mysteries: Through the Annunciation (1) and Visitation (2), we get a glimpse at Mary's joyful yes to God. She gives birth to Jesus in the Nativity (3). Mary and Joseph present their son at the temple (4) and bring him there again when he is a teenager (5).

Luminous Mysteries: Jesus is baptized in the Jordan River (1) before Mary gives him a nudge to his first miracle at Cana (2). Jesus proclaims the Gospel (3), is transfigured on Mount Tabor (4), and institutes the Eucharist (5). The light is shining!

Sorrowful Mysteries: Jesus prays in agony in Gethsemane (1), knowing his hour of suffering has come. After his betrayal and arrest, Jesus is scourged (2) and crowned with thorns (3). He carries his cross (4), and Mary stands at the foot of the cross as he is crucified (5).

Glorious Mysteries: Christ is risen in glory (1)! After appearing to those he loves, he ascends into heaven (2). Jesus' followers receive the Holy Spirit at Pentecost (3). Mary, unaffected by original sin, is assumed body and soul into heaven (4), where she is crowned queen, humble mother of Christ the King (5).

Answer to the Question about Divine Mercy Sunday: Pope John Paull II on April 22, 2001 designated the Sunday after Easter as the Sunday of Divine Mercy in the General Roman Calendar. This was one year after the Canonization of Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun who in 1937 wrote about her vision that the feast of Divine Mercy would be celebrated in her local chapel, would be attended by large crowds, and that the same celebration would be held in Rome attended by the pope, The special prayer associated with this Sunday is the Chaplet of Divine Mercy.

Please let us know if you have any questions. You can also make ties/binding instead of elastic (20") across top and bottom if you don't have the elastic available.
