Dear Friends,

This weekend we will be putting a "crown" of flowers upon statues of the Virgin Mary at the Masses. This is called a "May Crowning." So, two things: One on statues and then another on how Catholics speak about the saints like the Virgin Mary a lot.

First on statues: During Christmastime there are many statues and images of Jesus, Mary and Joseph and the Magi and Shepherds all around us through greeting cards, Nativity sets, etc. Sometimes people set up large Nativity sets in their yards even for all to see.

These images are, of course, just **REMINDERS** of the religious aspect of the Christmas season, and they help us to remember the birth of Christ even while we are at home.

It's funny, no one seems to object, ever, to a Nativity scene at Christmastime (unless it's non-religious people wanting those sets off of any public property).

But some people do have questions (oftentimes not meaning to be offensive at all) but they do question why Catholics use images **all year long** to remind us of aspects or stories from our faith: Using statues, stained glass, paintings, and icons. It simply is religious art that is meant to **REMIND** us of what they did and to **INSPIRE** us.

Part of this objection comes from looking at Exodus 20:4 where God himself shares with the Jewish people the following: "You shall not make for yourself an idol, or any likeness of what is in heaven above or on the earth beneath or in the water under the earth."

But, five chapters after Exodus 20, there is a very interesting text where God asks the Jewish people to decorate the tabernacle, the place where God would dwell among the Israelites, with two golden statues of angels. In Exodus 25:18b-19 we hear: "And make two cherubim out of hammered gold at the ends of the cover. Make one cherub on one end and the second cherub on the other; make the cherubim of one piece with the cover, at the two ends."

So, while the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20:1-7) God told the Israelites not to make "idols," (as in their WORSHIP of the statue of the golden calf that had transpired out in the desert), even God is comfortable with using IMAGES as ART in Exodus 25. That this is what Catholics do, we do not worship any statue of any saint.....we use all religious art, whether it is of Jesus or a saint, to remind us of the stories of our faith and to inspire us.

Then about Mary and the saints in our Catholic spirituality. Catholics know that Jesus is our Savior and that we aren't saved by Mary and the other saints. But, Catholics talk a lot about the saints because they are **EXAMPLES** for us in **OUR** faith journeys.

We ask them to pray for us not to take the place of Jesus's grace, but because they are our **SPIRITUAL FAMILY** and they love us.

In the end the Catholic faith always emphasizes that we are part of a community and part of a family that is on earth and in heaven. I think that our individualistic Western society causes some Christians to think that their faith journey is also supposed to be rather solitary, that they try to access Jesus in a solitary way.

Let's give thanks for our Catholic faith that reminds us that we always have the saints praying for us and all the Church praying for us throughout our spiritual lives, and let's remember that our job is not just to get saved by Jesus in the end, but to drag as many people along with us as possible!

CARING FOR CREATION MINISTRY:

So, last week Thursday, April 22nd was Earth Day. Many of us stopped on their otherwise busy day and did something to make a difference in our

fragile world. Some of us planted Native Plants in our yard, in a pot on the balcony or even at an event with an Environmental Group. I just want to thank you so much and offer a blessing for whatever you did or do on a daily basis. When going to the nursery to pick out your plants, ask where the natives are. Use you phone and look it up right there in the store. When the plant or shrub is from Europe or the Far East it is generally not a good thing. This is particularly true with invasive perennials that can escape into naturalized areas by birds and mammals eating seeds. Some of the things we worked on was planting native flowers by our Youth Group in the *NO MOW* area of the storm water pond. We also found and cleaned up, yes wait for it, more English Ivy on the West side of the property.



Continuing to pick up trash along Riva Road, to make it a pleasant drive on the daily visits to Church. Have you seen the "WHY" signs? They seem to have made some folks think twice and really made a difference even slowed the flow a bit. The

"Please Don't Litter" signs, not as much, but maybe. At least every other week I make a run thru there just to keep up. Trying to make it a prayerful time as I walk along and be at peace with those that litter. It can be difficult. Beer, liquor, water and juice bottles and fast food trash are most commonly found. Governor Bridge Road is such a mess from Riva to Davidsonville Road. It is so sad. A request was put in to the County Roads, because of the safety issues, to clean it up around the first of April. We shall see. Would love to hear from our parishioners on what they did on Earth Day and what they have incorporated into their daily lives that shows they care for God's Creation.
